**Music Sunday – A Renaissance Reflection**

**Ms. Debra Morris-Bennett and the First Parish Choir  
with special guests, Solstice Sakbuts**

This year, David Lindsey and Alan Johnson playing tenor sakbut and Leslie Havens playing bass sakbut, will join Debra and the First Parish Choir to bring us a selection of 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> century Renaissance music. In selecting the choral pieces for this service, Debra wanted to offer a spiritual respite from the “noise” of today’s complex world. What she discovered, however, as she explored the music more deeply, were familiar themes that not only reflect the complexities of the 16<sup>th</sup> century world but also suggest mirror reflections of the complexities of our own world: world-weariness contrasted with our longing for wholeness, goodness, and vitality; the urgency to live well and fully in the face of inevitable death. In this music-filled worship service, listeners may rest in the beauty of the music and reflect on the ever-present human condition that spans the centuries.

### **Nov. 21 Share the Plate with The Heifer Project**

The Heifer Project works on the premise that teaching people how to be self-sufficient, providing them with “seed animals,” teaching the skills they need to grow and market their products and to share their successes in the community will do more to help communities out of poverty than most other forms of aid. Heifer might provide a flock of chicks or a female milk goat. Recipients then raise these animals and are obligated to pass one of the first born offspring to another family, so that another family can also become self-sufficient. Heifer has a teaching farm in Rutland, MA where agricultural methods are developed and demonstrated and you can learn more about what they do. The Heifer Project operates in rural areas of more than 50 countries, including the US. All projects teach sustainable agriculture without expensive chemicals or tools – methods that the people can continue to use and prosper. The animals provided vary appropriately, based on the country and local terrain and cultures of the people served. Everything from ducks to bees to water buffalo. The hallmark of the program has always been the obligation to pass it forward – the communities build sustainability together. ## *R.E.lections by a chalice* D.R.E.amer

At the end of our “Characters of Compassion” worship service on Halloween Sunday, many of you shared generous compliments with me. A few of you commented that my confidence as a worship leader has grown significantly since I first started here. I quickly assumed that it was the years of experience that has helped me grow more confident, but later wondered if it was something else.

Many years ago, when I was a columnist for the Watertown newspaper, the editor used to love when I wrote something I was passionate about. She would always declare that such columns were my “best writing ever.” It was an important lesson for me in realizing that our best work is done when we are inspired and excited.

When I set out to create an intergenerational service with the theme of “Characters of Compassion,” I wondered how could I possibly come up with something engaging for the kids that would truly speak to the adults. I knew that the idea of inviting people to dress up could bomb miserably into a service that lacked any deep meaning. Then I met with Amy R to write a story for the service. We started out by talking about characters who have inspired her. She shared a few, and then she mentioned Dorothy from “The Wizard of Oz.” I asked her if she had ever seen the musical “Wicked” in which we meet Elphaba, also known as the Wicked Witch of the West, and hear her life story. We discover that no person is good or evil, but that everyone makes some good choices and some selfish ones. I wondered what would have happened in “The Wizard of Oz” if Dorothy and Elphaba had ever had a conversation and realized that they didn’t need to be afraid of each other. And that was when Amy’s incredible imagination came alive, and she helped create a great alternative story in which Elphaba helped Dorothy go home to her family.

Creating that skit with Amy inspired and excited me. Beyond not just judging people as good or evil, I realized that everyone has a gift to share. We must gratefully accept the kindness that others have to share with us and realize that we too can be heroes by sharing kindness with others. We can all make our world a nicer place one moment at a time by stopping to share compassion with each other.

Having a theme filled with messages that I truly believed in really helped me to feel strong and confident about sharing the service with you. So confident was I that I risked trying crazy stunts (like a costume change) that I normally wouldn’t dare do during a worship service. But if I really wanted to project these meaningful messages, I had to do it dramatically and with pride.

When the service was done, I thought the best part was the moments of connection – how I got to have fun working with Amy and how I heard many of you were inspired to meet someone new at Social Hour or appreciate the people already in your lives. I believe that this balance of fun, connection, and meaning is what is so special about being at First Parish. I’ve known this for many years that this magic balance works wonders in religious education program and youth ministries. But now I’m discovering that adults need a balance of fun, connection, and meaning as well.

I recently began working with our Faith in Action Team to create a brochure about all of the

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worthwhile initiatives and programs happening here. It led to some of us working together to kick off the next step of the Water Conservation Project. As we began emailing to work out the details, I quickly noticed that we had a nice balance of working together while moving forward. That camaraderie led to some appreciation for each other and to some fun (maybe even some silly) moments shared. The job was getting done with a smile on our faces, and it made me look forward to my next project with these wonderful people.

I hope all of you are fortunate to have experiences here at First Parish that bring you fun, connection, and meaning. If you aren't, come talk to me and I will help you find some!

## Barakat Thanks First Parish for our Walk for Literacy Support

First Parish again this year was a substantial contributor to the Barakat Walk for Literacy. Team Sudbury (Tom A, Stephen G and Carolyn L) **raised over \$2,300**. We thank the many members and friends of First Parish who were among the contributors. This is the second year your Faith in Action team group has sponsored a team, and we plan to make this an on-going tradition at First Parish. Barakat, in partnership with its local affiliates, runs seven schools and more than 30 literacy programs for girls and women in Afghanistan, Pakistan and India. Barakat is a UUSC partner organization that provides human rights education as part of its programming, and recently provided assistance to Pakistani flood victims moving into the undamaged towns where they operate schools that educate more than 800 students and offer a lending library, computer lab and qualified teachers. ## Single-Payer Ballot Question Wins in All 14 Districts

All of the Massachusetts districts that had a Nov. ballot question supporting single-payer health care on their ballots voted for it. Those of us who would like to see Massachusetts have a single-payer health care system need to make it clear to our state legislators that the people of this state want this, that we do not want so many of our premium dollars to be spent on the health insurance industry that provides no health care; uses our money to deny care, to pay for marketing, advertising and lobbying (including against single payer!); and causes large administrative costs. We need to support the work of Senator Eldridge, who will be the sponsor of our new health Care Trust bill, by meeting with our legislators and sending them letters, and by writing letters-to-the-editor and op-eds, and making our voices heard on local and state tv.

The ten districts that had it on their ballots two years ago voted overwhelmingly for it. This time the total vote of the fourteen districts, comprised of 80 cities and towns that had it on the ballot was at least 63.5% in its favor. Please **take action** and let your voice be heard.

### Vigil for Transgender Day of Remembrance

The Welcoming Congregation Committee of First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church of Chelmsford, 2 Westford St. in Chelmsford center, will hold a vigil for Transgender Day of Remembrance on **Saturday, Nov. 20**, from 7-8 pm, in the chapel. Additional parking may be found behind the Old Town Hall across route 4, and in the Municipal lot off Route 4.)

Transgender Day of Remembrance is a day set aside annually to memorialize those who have lost their lives in the year since the last Day of Remembrance as a result of gender identity intolerance. The event is held in November to honor Rita Hester, whose murder in our own state, in Allston, on Nov. 28, 1998, led to the web project "[Remembering Our Dead](#)" and a San Francisco candlelight vigil in 1999. Rita Hester's murder — like most murders of transgender people— has never been solved. Although not every person memorialized identified themselves as being transgender, each was a victim of violence based on bias about gender identity.
