The First Parish Choir, joined by seven special guests will lead the congregation in a spirited spring revival designed to “get the sap rising.”

Three popular Boston vocalists, Suzanne Boucher, Sally Sweitzer and Maddie Sifantus combine their talents in the soulful group, TVS. They will be joined by Wendy Sobel on guitar, Larry Luddecke on piano, Reed Butler on electric base, and Ed Scheer, former sideman of R & B legend Johnny Adams, on drums.

Music director Debra Morris-Bennett says of this musical worship service, “We will be singing songs from the African, African American, and African diaspora along with other music inspired and influenced by those traditions. This kind of music has a purpose, she explains, “to comfort, to give courage, to lift up injustice and to give us strength to “keep on keepin’ on.”

“This music is guaranteed to make our historic meetinghouse rock!” say our minister, Katie Lee Crane. And, she acknowledges, when every day brings change and challenge, we need some spirit-lifting music in these troubled and troubling times.

Rhyming Hope and History
Rev. Victor Carpenter preaching

The title *Rhyming Hope and History* comes from a poem by Nobel Laureate Seamus Heaney. His counsel is that history tends to crush hope; that, if we only look at the results of historical actions, there is not much that we can be optimistic about. But every once in a while something happens that awakens the spirit. I recall the three days (and nights) when Egyptians gathered in Cairo's Tahrir Square in peaceful demonstrations which led to the withdrawal of President Mubarak. Even in the darkest of social circumstances (South African apartheid) hope has a way of asserting itself.

Vic Carpenter has been serving UU churches for more than 50 years. His ministries include Boston's historic Arlington St. Church, First Unitarian in San Francisco and the Unitarian Church in Cape Town, South Africa. At present he is the Minister Emeritus of the Belmont, MA UU church. Vic has been president of the UU Service Committee, chair of a variety of social concerns committees and organizations dealing with issues of homelessness, Palestine and Peace, and AIDS, been published in a variety of journals, including the *UU World*, and has written a collection of essays entitled "Stations of the Spirit."

Happy Spring! That's the popular message for this time of year, and the celebrations of Easter, Spring Equinox, and May Day highlight this love of the earth springing back to life. Katie Lee will be preaching later this month on Easter Sunday about "Cosmic Resurrection," and her topic inspires me to be aware of the many rebirths happening around us. The sun and warm days are coming back, and the trees and flowers are budding. What else is coming back to life?

Spring is a fascinating time as it brings alive the hope that rebirth is possible. Watching the earth come back to life reminds us that what we thought was dead and gone can possibly come back to life. The Christian message of this holiday is about their religious leader coming back to life, but what about the rest of us? What does resurrection and re-birth mean to us? What are each of us celebrating this time of year?

Winter, the season of rest and reflection, is ending, and it can be a perfect time to welcome new beginnings. But like most holidays, real life isn't so easy or pretty. Our lives can be filled with our own sadness, losses, and challenges. From medical issues and financial hardships to memories of lost loved ones, our lives don't magically become easy because Spring has arrived. Protestant Congregational as a child, I cut myself off from my religious identity as a Christian in my young adult years when I realized that I didn't believe in the Christian trinity. Frankly, I just didn't believe that Jesus really came back to life, rose from the dead and become one with God. As I became more confident in my Unitarian Universalist identity, gaining the confidence and freedom to revisit the story with my own perspective, I began to wonder what might have happened that fateful day that I can believe in. Just like when I've lost my loved ones, I'm sure his followers were devastated and sad. They sincerely believed that Jesus would live on – and he did, forever in their hearts. The more times people remembered Jesus by passing on his stories of great compassion, the stronger his rebirth became. He was an incredible religious leader of his time and because of that, his rebirth began a new religion. His story has taught us that even after death, people can make a difference in our world. Memories of our loving actions can continue to inspire people for many, many years to come.

It's not the Easter story of Jesus that I think about most during this time of year when I consider what rebirths I'd like to welcome into my life; it's the *life* story of Jesus that inspires me. Here was this great man who lived his life with compassion for all people. Jesus didn't let fear and the stresses of life get the best of him. He did what he needed to do to stay positive, loving, and helpful to those around him who most needed him. He makes me want to be more positive and compassionate. The story of the life of Jesus makes me want to let go of the stresses of my life and keep my focus on what really matters – love. Yes, love! Love is what I would like to see growing wildly all around our world this Spring. Love for our selves, love for our children, love for all people, and love for all living beings. When I say love, I don't mean the child-like love that only knows happiness and joy. I mean the type of love that Jesus spread that understands the complexities of humanity and still loves all people with great compassion. I mean the type of love that can, did and will continue to change our world.

I also know from the story of the life of Jesus that sharing love isn't easy. Keeping our attitudes positive in a life of unexpected twists and turns can be challenging, but the good news is that we have each other. We aren't alone carrying forward the loving lessons of all those who have inspired each of us. We come together in different ways planting the seeds of love and compassion. May all of these seeds blossom this Spring and throughout the coming year!

The Search for the Search Committee

As part of our ministerial search, First Parish needs a 7-member search committee and we need YOUR input on who that committee should include. Members of the Nominating Committee and the Trustees are about half way through the process of calling every member and active friend in our congregation to chat about the search.

The more time we each spend thinking about the following questions, the better off we'll be – our Search Committee will better represent our entire congregation and will reflect the way we want to present ourselves to the ministerial candidates. We're going to ask you all the same questions:

- What are the good qualities needed for someone to possess to serve on a ministerial search committee?
- Who in the congregation works well with others?
- Who can represent the whole congregation well (which would include looking out for the needs of children) and not just a piece or "faction" of the church? Who can serve the entire congregation?
- Who knows the history and culture of the church, whether old or new to the congregation?
- Who has been and/or is active in the congregation and demonstrated themselves to be both responsible leaders and responsible participants?
- One of the most attractive qualities a congregation can hold is self-awareness of who they are—their strengths and weaknesses, what the congregation is like at its best, at its worst, and on autopilot or an average day? Who would be able to know and relate that well to potential ministers?
- Who in the congregation do you trust to work on behalf of the congregation after thinking about all these questions?

WALK FOR HUNGER – MAY 1



On Sunday, May 1, First Parish will be sponsoring a team in the 42nd annual walk to raise money for Project Bread. We would be very happy if you would join our team and help us meet our team goal of \$6000.00. We would also be very happy if you would use this opportunity to **include hunger prevention** in your portfolio of charitable giving. This is important work for all of us. Food insecurity continues to rise in Massachusetts with 660,000 people struggling to put food on the table, an **11% increase** from last year. The economy is still struggling and families are seeing their monthly income stretched beyond capacity. The most vulnerable among us — children, elderly, disabled — are particularly hard hit. This is no longer an issue for others. The chances are great that **you know someone who is struggling with hunger.**

We know that hunger is tightly linked to low achievement, illness, infection. In 2009, **13% of all children lived in food insecure households.** How are they able to learn and get ahead? 

Share the Plate with the Elizabeth Stone House on April 10

On Music Sunday, April 10, we will Share the Plate with the Elizabeth Stone house. Located in Roxbury, Stone House helps women and families rebuild their lives after experiencing domestic violence, mental illness, substance abuse and other forms of trauma. The Stone House provides residential and non-residential programs, as well as an emergency shelter for those who are in immediate need. The Stone House's residential programs include a three-month Domestic Violence Shelter and an 18-month Transitional Housing Program. The Stone House specializes in working with survivors of abuse and violence who suffer from additional mental health and substance abuse problems. It provides a number of community support groups and personal economic development programs. Additionally, a family service group works in the community providing programs that strengthen the family to reduce the possibility of having children removed from the home by DCF. The Stone House works in partnership with women to develop practical, step-by-step goals that tackle the complexity of issues that each is facing. Elizabeth Stone house is open to all, but primarily serves women and children in the surrounding communities, predominantly women of color.

Like many organizations, they lost funding this past year due to government budget cuts. There is currently a matching grant program through April 25. We have the opportunity to assure this match is fully utilized. Please support this important program helping nearby families with your generous contribution.
