The Feast of Fools

Once a year we celebrate what some call “The Feast of Fools.” It began as an ancient pre-Christian ritual, and remained popular in many forms right through the Middle Ages. Join us in an upside-down world where revelers wake up the sun with noisy celebrations, sometimes even raucous ones. All the fun has a serious message, though, in which light overcomes dark and good vanquishes evil. There are dancers with bells, swords and sticks, mummers, tricksters and always a fool to re-enact an ancient ritual of Midwinter where, on the longest night, the revelers stay awake through the night to call forth the sun from the womb of night. As always there will be the traditions – the Mummer’s Play, the Morris and Sword dancers, and the Lord of the Dance leading us *all* in the dance. And, as always, there will be a few surprises! Bring the family. Bring the neighbors. Help us bring back the sun!

Dec. 5 we will Share the Plate with Beyond the 11th

Beyond the 11th was founded by two American women who were widowed as a result of the 9/11 plane crashes. They realized that their suffering as widows in this country pales in comparison to that of Afghan widows. Donations to Beyond the 11th go directly to income-generating programs benefiting female-headed households. Beyond the 11th establishes partnerships with non-governmental organizations (NGOs) working in Afghanistan. These organizations have long-term commitments to the region, strong grassroots networks, and are committed to assisting Beyond the 11th in helping widows and their families reach self-sufficiency. They collaborate with each organization to develop programs that sustainably address the needs of widows through literacy and income-generating skills training, from receiving a dairy cow to having a market for the rugs they already know how to weave, steady income can be provided with your help.

Justice Sunday: What the Dickens Was Scrooge Trying to Tell Us?

Charles Dickens wrote *A Christmas Carol* in 1843 shortly after he left his Anglican roots and became a member of the Hanover Square Unitarian congregation. His much-loved Christmas tale has since etched an image of an idyllic Christmas-day gathering of family and friends around a bountiful table. But, it also contains the theme that dominated Dickens' writing most of his life: the need for social reform and improved labor conditions. His own experience of a nearly idyllic childhood abruptly interrupted when his father was sent to debtor's prison, taught him first-hand of the grim realities and inhumane conditions that working class people faced everyday. Now, 167 years after its publication, let's revisit the story and see what lessons we've actually learned (or haven't). And let us ask, too, what role our faith plays in how present-day Unitarian Universalists seek to expose, change and improve conditions that – to this day – continue to exclude many people from the social and economic justice they deserve.

Making Meanings BY REV. KATIE LEE CRANE

Last week I received three urgent pleas to STAND ON THE SIDE OF LOVE. I have. And I will again.

After years of talking about how the military's discriminatory Don't Ask, Don't Tell policy must end, it has come down to the next few weeks. If the Senate is going to repeal this law, they must act now. I serve as the Military Endorser for our UU faith, meaning that I vouch for the character and professional standing of individuals interested in serving as military chaplains. Currently there are thirteen UU ministers in this capacity...; I would love to see hundreds serving in the field. Yet how can I, in good conscience, push a large scale recruitment effort... knowing that [our ministers] will be forced to deny who they are or collude with the denial of full equal rights for those who serve along side them?

As an adopted child of another era, I know first-hand what a "Don't tell" policy feels like. (Asking was fine; telling was taboo.) It's hard enough to grapple with confusion about who you are and harder still to lie about it. I also know a Navy officer who, obeying orders, had to court-martial a sailor for being gay yet, for his own safety, stay closeted himself. We all know children who are being bullied because of who they are or who they are perceived to be.

STANDING ON THE SIDE OF LOVE is an interfaith public advocacy campaign sponsored by the Unitarian Universalist Association. Its goal is to elevate compassionate religious voices to influence public attitudes and public policy through community activism, social networking, and media outreach.

In short, it proclaims: *No one should be dehumanized through acts of exclusion, oppression or violence because of their identity.* You may translate "identity" as "them." Muslim. Immigrant. Gay. Lesbian. Bisexual. Transgender. These are labels – targets for hate – not people. So is "poor," "disabled," "person of color," "mentally ill," "special needs." I pray for the day when no banner or campaign will be needed because there will be no "them;" there will only be "us." But we're not even close.

Friends, our witness and our work is needed now more than ever. Pick up the phone, pick up your pen, pick up your feet and act. Do what you can to harness the power of love against hate and fear-mongering. This is at the core of living our faith.

It's Time to Join, Reinstate or Renew your membership in the UUSC!

This is the time of year when most of us make some decisions, or implement ones we already planned, for where our charitable giving will do the most good. There are many worthy organizations asking for your support. I am proud to be a strong sponsor of the UUSC and encourage you to be also. The **Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)** is the *Faith in Action* organization going beyond our congregational and national boundaries. The UUSC is fully independent of and not funded by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). The UUSC programs depend upon each of us.

Are you one of the 31 First Parish Families whose UUSC membership expires soon or one of the 10 families whose membership has lapsed? **Please renew now.** If you've never supported the UUSC, **now is the time to begin.** Two easy ways to give are: 1) go to <http://www.uusc.org/donate> and click on the "Donate Now" on the left under "ways to give," or 2) pick up a donation envelope from the office or the FIA bulletin board.

Why support the UUSC? The UUSC is founded on the principle that human rights, as defined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (<http://www.un.org/en/documents/udhr/>), are indeed *rights*, but in many places no one guarantees these rights and justice must be worked for every day. **Rights are not charity.** Rights are won by a continuous process of human struggle, and they carry with them responsibilities. The UUSC is active in helping groups to acquire and defend civil liberties, economic justice, environmental justice, and basic human rights in humanitarian crisis situations. That takes many dedicated people on the ground, which in turn takes financial support from us.

Why support the UUSC NOW? The UUSC has a tradition of working with and through local organizations in the 50+ countries around the world where it is active. UUSC money does not end up waiting to be distributed in times of need, nor going through major bureaucracies, each taking a cut. The UUSC partners with small NGO's (Non-governmental organizations) that are already in countries in need of assistance. Their goal is to provide sustenance, not just aid. And they are in places other groups never get to.

The UUSC has been stretched to the limits by the disasters in Haiti and Pakistan and the ongoing issues in Africa and South America. Now more than ever we need to support UUSC efforts to help change the circumstances of people, not just provide temporary aid. Please join or renew and help make First Parish a cornerstone of support for the UUSC. Thank you.

The UUSC in Haiti Now

The UUSC is not just in Port au Prince, but in the countryside where displaced people fled and then got flooded. UUSC was active in Haiti for many years before the earthquake, and already worked through local organizations that could use their help. Immediately after the earthquake, UUSC worked with Haitian grassroots organizations to make sure people had food to eat and the pots to cook it in. With UUSC support, program partners created jobs that helped put food on the table and send children to school. They also bought and distributed local seeds to help survivors and their host families in the countryside increase food production.

UUSC's goal is to support earthquake survivors who are being overlooked by the mainstream aid response, ensuring their access to food, livelihoods, shelter, protection, representation, and psychosocial support. A year later, much remains to be done and the UUSC is still there actively working through many partner organizations including:

- The Trauma Resource Institute teaches aid workers, social workers, community leaders, and earthquake survivors about the biological responses to trauma and ways to positively manage those responses.
- Konbit Famn Saj ensures that women street vendors in and around Port-au-Prince have access to the capital, training, and support they need to recover their livelihoods. Konbit Famn Saj assists earthquake-affected women in becoming financially independent.
- Beyond Borders to build a child-protection network in camps and help communities prevent trafficking of children into slavery.
- Groundswell International helps survivors who fled to the countryside earn income that will enable them to put food on the table and send their children to school.
- The Association for the Promotion of Integral Family Healthcare (APROSIFA), provides health services through their community clinic, with a focus on reproductive and sexual rights, malnutrition, and infectious disease.

Currently the UUSC is planning to begin volunteer work trips to Haiti, to assist residents in rebuilding by working through these partner organizations. As more details become available, you will be kept informed.

Ask Me about Chalice Circles

Look for someone wearing a button “Ask me about Chalice Circles” or speak to Katie Lee. Chalice Circles are small, committed groups of no more than 10 people who meet monthly for two hours. A trained convener leads the meeting using a prescribed format. The format requires that only one person speak at a time and that there be no cross-talk.

Chalice Circles provide an opportunity for exploration to those seeking spiritual growth, those looking to know themselves better and those who simply want to discuss questions of faith and meaning. You won't be judged, you won't be given advice, you won't be challenged. You will be heard. You will be supported. You will be energized by compassionate listening and the genuine relationships that grow in the circle.

From now until January 3, Chalice Circles have an open enrollment period. Although a person may join a Chalice Circle at any time during the year, this is the time that each Circle intentionally opens up: 1) to welcome any who would like to explore joining a Chalice Circle, and 2) offering current participants the chance to opt out, change circles, or recommit. Imagine this: You live in one of the poorest countries on Earth. You can't read or write. You've spent a lifetime caring for your family and your household in a country perpetually ravaged by war, with little resources or infrastructure. You are not allowed to go to the market without a male escort. You cannot drive or ride a bicycle. You are expected to cover yourself from head to toe in public. You do what you can to raise healthy, happy children. You love your children fiercely and on the worst days, this love is what keeps you going. When a toothache throbs in your jaw for months, you live with it. You don't have access to a doctor. You can't afford to send your children to school — even though you want desperately for them to become educated — because your family's survival depends on everyone working. Even if you could afford it, the nearest girls' school is a three-hour walk away, which isn't a safe journey for your daughters.

And then, one day, your husband is killed. In your patriarchal society, your husband's death means that you have lost your social protection and your voice. What little property you owned now belongs to your in-laws. In the event that you re-marry, you may be forced to leave your children behind. You are 35 years old. Your life expectancy is 44. You have no marketable skills. Two of your children are still little and can't be left alone. Your 10-year-old son had an occasional job pushing a wheelbarrow but he's become sick and can't work. There are no local agencies to help you. Your children look to you with silent, hungry faces. It's been days since anyone ate.

What can an Afghan widow do? Beyond the 11th works to ensure that there is an answer to this question. For more information, visit: <https://www.beyondthe11th.org/index.php>
