Clergy Offer “Best Of”

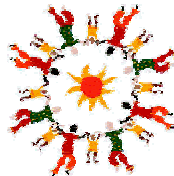
This year the Sudbury Clergy Association – made up of religious professionals from a dozen communities of faith located in Sudbury – have compiled a book of *Best Sermons and Teachings*. If you would like a copy, it is available in the office during weekday office hours (9 am – 1 pm), and during coffee hour on Sunday mornings until supplies run out. It went like hotcakes at the Interfaith Community Thanksgiving Worship Service. The Association asks for a donation of \$3 to cover printing and production costs.

Festival of Revelry, Sunday, Dec. 3, 10am

Don't miss our annual Revels Service this Sunday. The Hop Brook Morris Dancers will be featured in the service, led by Tom K, who trains the young Morris Dancers and helps create this ritual worship service every year along with the staff and many volunteers.

This worship service includes much singing and seasonal revelry, as well as a traditional Mummer's Play. It is modeled after the well-known Christmas Revels offered annually in Cambridge but it is not strictly entertainment; it explores ancient religious themes of indigenous peoples. People of all ages are welcome to join the revelry. Guests from the larger community are most welcome. Invite your friends and neighbors to come along. The more the merrier!

The service draws its archetypal themes of death and rebirth from a variety of traditions marking the winter solstice. This year it will draw on the traditions of the Sáámi people, or "The People of the Sun," nomadic reindeer herding societies near the Artic Circle who migrated from place to place in what we know call Norway, Sweden, Finland and parts of Russia.

An Invitation to All

Dear Friends of First Parish of Sudbury,

We would like to invite you to participate in an important effort in the life of First Parish. Over the next few weeks a focus group will be held to discuss matters of importance in the life of our church. The focus group is a moderated discussion of the kinds of things that have surfaced in retreats, congregational meetings, and that the current leaders have tried to capture in this year's congregational goals. These are small groups – no more than ten people – but, taken together, the participants represent a broad spectrum of our First Parish congregation. Your insight, ideas, and experience are invaluable and we hope that you will participate.

The focus group is sponsored by the Committee on Ministry and will be led by members of the committee, aided by members of the congregation who are experienced facilitators. One focus group is offered at three different times so that the groups remain small and accommodate the schedules of most people. Each participant will come to just one of the 2-hour meetings shown below. The discussion will be lively, diverse, and fun. We hope that no matter what your level of church involvement is now or has been in the past, you will be part of this effort. We ask only this of every participant: bring yourself and your experiences; give us two hours. You will not be tapped to volunteer for anything. You will not be asked for money.

**Endings & Beginnings Service
Sunday, January 7, 2007**

It has become an important ritual on the first Sunday in January to honor those who have died and those who have been born during the past year. If you are new to First Parish, here's how it works--we read these names during our worship service and, when the name of someone we love is read, we stand to honor that person. What often happens is that, when the names have all been read, nearly everyone is standing. It is always a very moving experience.

Drive your car smarter, saving dollars adds up

Our last *Green Tips* was on not letting cars idle. Here are more car driving tips to save energy and money.

- Ø **Drive less aggressively.** Rapid acceleration and braking can lower highway gas mileage by 30% and town gas mileage by as much as 20%. Coast to that stop sign.
- Ø **Slow down on the highway.** Driving only 5 mph over the speed limit on the highway results in an average fuel economy loss of 6%.
- Ø **Keep the engine tuned.** Regular maintenance can save up to 160 gallons of gas per year.
- Ø **Check the tires.** Proper tire pressure increases tire life and improves gas mileage. Low tire pressure wastes over two million gallons of gasoline in the USA every day.
- Ø **Drive less.** Leaving the car parked is the best way to save dollars in purchasing more gas and cut pollution. Plan your shopping trips for minimum driving. Car pool.
- Ø **Don't idle.** Again, unless you own a hybrid gas-electric car like the Toyota Prius, which automatically turns off its engine when the vehicle is stopped, letting the engine idle for more than about 10 seconds uses more gasoline than shutting it off and restarting and does not harm the engine.
