

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Making Meanings

When we applied for a Woburn Grant (which we received) to fund the position of Community Life Coordinator, we stated:

We feel called and committed to radical hospitality in our congregation. For us, it is both a spiritual and ethical imperative that gets to the core of what it means to be human and living in community.

Some of you have asked: "What IS radical hospitality?" Isn't hospitality simply being nice to one another? Why do we have to suggest that it's radical – that sounds so extreme. It's not extreme, but it is courageous. It's not always easy to reach out to someone and ask: "May I know you better?"

It's also not a new idea. The concept of hospitality as a spiritual imperative grows from just about every great religious tradition.

Wisdom stories throughout the ages teach us the importance of welcoming the outsider, the pilgrim... to see the holy in the stranger.

In a little book called *Radical Hospitality*¹, the authors point out "we are all guests, all travelers, all a little lost, and all looking for a place to rest a while." They say this kind of hospitality is about connecting with people – the ones at our gate and those a world away.

So it's about reaching out. About listening. About stretching (sometimes) outside our comfort zone when we encounter those whom we perceive to be different from ourselves. It's about opening up to the possibility that we may find more similarity

than difference or, even, that we may find genuine difference to be engaging and life-enhancing.

This kind of hospitality is about listening, a special kind of deep attentiveness to all that live - a sharpening of the ears of the heart.

When we listen in this way, listen as a spiritual practice, we hear how people really feel, find out who they really are. "When we listen like this," say the book's authors, "the sound of another's suffering changes everything." Sometimes, they acknowledge, it unsettles us; often it makes us take a stand for justice.

I would argue this is a call and a commitment in our congregation. We live it out when we stand for economic justice, for freedom of religion and speech, for sharing the common wealth for the common good.

The rainbow flag represents this kind of hospitality. So does the elevator and the assistive listening devices. And, yes, the Green Sanctuary initiative is a kind of radical hospitality to our earth and all living things. And the work that some of you do in prisons, at shelters, and food pantries and You know it is a very long list.

We may start out thinking we can help someone or something, but inevitably we grow from the experience as much as anyone whom we've "helped."

Listen. It will break your heart, but it will also give you heart. And, it will give you more - it will give you life.

Friends, let us heed the call and make the commitment to be a people who practice mutual reverence as a way of being human.

I'm honored and thrilled to be writing my first column for our newsletter! Welcome back to another incredible year at First Parish!!

We officially started the year with our annual "ingathering water service". As I processed through the congregation and then sat up front, I was very nervous. I thought, "Will this community like me? How will I ever follow in the footsteps of their many well-loved religious educators?" Before these fears could get me too distracted, I looked out into the sanctuary. Right in front of me sat some of our youth. I looked at them and they smiled at me. I smiled back and one of them made a silly face that almost made me laugh out loud. And that was exactly when I "knew" that I'd be just fine! Maybe even really good!!

These youth and the many friendly people I met after the worship service reminded me of one of my guiding work principles ... that most people come to church for "connection". They have other goals and interests, but "connection with people and families who have similar values" is often the #1 reason. It's important to remember this in all that we do at First Parish.

I went to the district's workshop on Hospitality (in August with a First Parish team) and this was one theme they highlighted. We learned of Malidome Some who is sharing inspiring messages about the "life philosophies" of his village in West Africa ... Community is the flower of belonging. We each have a purpose and we are drawn into community to serve one another and the world.

The next day, I attended our summer worship service led by Dawn and Sarah Jun Shilts and was likewise impressed in countless ways. One message shared was inspired by Malidome. What is our one beautiful gift we are going to share? We meditated on that and then brought our gifts symbolically together as a whole in the form of a puzzle frame. Our children can fill in the puzzle illustrating the gifts they want to share. The most amazing thing is that the "community" puzzle reminds us that we create a magical synergy together as our collaborative and collective whole is more powerful and special than what any one of us can do alone. I have a wonderful feeling that this "synergy of our gifts" theme will revisit us many times this year as we come together to connect, worship, seek, explore, work, and act.

Rev. Katie Lee Crane



Board of Trustees Report

Each summer the Board of Trustees retreats from the nitty-gritty of normal life and emerges with a renewed vision of where we are and a clear set of congregational goals for the coming year. Katie Lee and other staff members participated in this inspiring process which resulted in a document which not only states this year’s goals, but goes on to give each one a spiritual framework and a set of potential action items.

Here are the goals themselves, along with Katie Lee’s philosophical setting for each one.

1. Clarify who we are in 2008 and identify who we want to be by 2018. Communicate [this] both within and beyond the Meeting House walls.

We are Unitarian Universalists gathered together as First Parish of Sudbury. Building on a history that reaches back to the early 17th century, we are re-visioning our faith community to meet the needs and challenges of the 21st century.

2. Deepen and expand Community Engagement

Hospitality is the spiritual and ethical practice of mutual reverence. We ask: “May I know you better?” We welcome engagement with people we do not know and may not understand.

We let other people into our hearts, and allow ourselves to be planted in theirs.

We connect with our neighbor and with others a world away on a level that stirs everyone involved.

We commit to a lively, courageous, bold way of living our values that demands that we take chances and change.

3. Commit to safety and sanctuary

We ensure that this building and this congregation is a sanctuary where all who engage here may trust that this is “holy ground,” where human actions and interactions – both individually and in relationship – will be guided by the principles of justice and hospitality.

Please plan to generously support Sandra's Lodge, Hestia House, and Olivia's Place. These are Emergency Family Shelters operated in Waltham, MA by the Middlesex Human Service Agency, Inc since 1999. There are many homeless families living at the shelters, with an average stay of 8 -12 months. There are almost 100 children at the shelter, of which about 40 children attend school in their home district. Besides supplying the residents with basic shelter and meals, these facilities provide services of case management and housing advocacy, which enable the families to move forward in attaining a more self-sufficient lifestyle.

We have supported Sandra's Lodge for six years with our backpack drive and Share the Plate contributions. Our Oct. 5 collection continues that support by purchasing Halloween costumes for the youngest children at the shelter, so they can participate in the celebrations at school.

Dr. Arnold Relman will discuss reforms needed to improve the U.S. health care system. In his book, *A Second Opinion: Rescuing America's Health Care*, Dr. Relman focuses on the impact of the commercialization of medicine, the merits of a single-payer plan, and the need to provide care that benefits patients.

Dr. Relman was formerly Editor-in-Chief of *The New England Journal of Medicine*. He is currently Professor Emeritus of Medicine and Social Medicine at Harvard Medical School and Senior Physician at Brigham and Women's Hospital.

Buddhist Meditation study & practice group

Thursdays, 1:00-2:30pm
starting October 2



This group provides a setting to learn about and to practice meditation and, for those who are interested, to receive support for the development of a regular meditation practice at home. Together we will explore fundamental aspects of the teachings of the Buddha, as they apply to everyday life. These meetings are open to people with little or no experience in meditation as well as to experienced practitioners -- anyone who is simply curious and would like to come check it out is most welcome.

Each Meditation study and practice group meeting will include:

~ a meditation period of 20-30 minutes, with simple instruction and guidance

~ a time to reflect on & discuss a short reading - we will be investigating subjects such as:

- Slowing down
- Cultivating compassion - for self & others
- Wise speech
- Patience
- Working with anger & other strong emotions

Readings will be from Jon KabatZinn, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chödrön & others

~ time for questions and discussion of participants' experiences of meditation either at home or during the class

We will also take time to discuss the benefits of meditation, which include the cultivation of insight and compassion, as well as increased physical, emotional and mental well-being.

Laine G will be the group facilitator. Laine has been a student of Buddhist teachings for 18 years and has taught meditation in various settings. Over the years she has studied and practiced in the Zen and Vipassana traditions.
